Our Ancient Past Identified

The Museums of Mississauga have a small collection of artifacts related to the earliest inhabitants in the area. Often the artifacts are found in people's yards or along streams and are difficult to properly date and identify. Dr. Robert J. Pearce, Executive Director of the Museum of Ontario Archaeology in London, Ontario generously identified our small collection and gave us a lot of useful information.

Jean Lindsay, a long-time resident of Clarkson, donated some items that she had found as a child near her family home on Sheridan Creek. The most interesting item was identified as a Lamoka or Normanskill type spearhead, Late Archaic period ca. 2500 B.C. According to the Southwestern Ontario: The First 12,000 Years Glossary (http://diggingontario.uwo.ca/Glossary. htm) a spearhead is the stone (or more rarely bone or copper) weapon tip attached to the end of a spear shaft; also referred to as a projectile point." Lamoka projectile points are manufactured by First Nations people living in north eastern North America, generally from 3500-2500 B.C.

The name derives from an archaeological site in Schuyler County, New York. This spear head actually predates the invention of the bow and arrow.

Donated in 2010 was a projectile point found in a garden on Willow Lane in Meadowvale Village. Projectile points are identified by the changes in the base. This one is not complete but Dr. Pearce thought it was corner-notched and may be a "Brewerton" type from the Late Archaic period c. 3000 B.C.

In 2008, Museums staff were able to salvage a large collection of items from Hugh O'Neil's farm on Mississauga Road. On the window sill in the kitchen of his old farmhouse was a box of Native artifacts. fossils and interesting looking rocks that he had found over the years on his property. Among the treasures was an "Innes" style spearhead dating from the Late Archaic period ca. 2500 B.C. Innes refers to a style of coarsely flaked, medium-sized spearhead commonly found near Brantford and the Grand River in Ontario. Also some stone "celts" which are defined as "a polished stone woodworking implement, more rarely of chipped stone, which includes adzes with asymmetrical bits and axes with symmetrical cutting bits." There were also a number of "bifaces" which is basically an unfinished blank that could be shaped into a projectile point or knife at a later time.

A big thank-you to Dr. Pearce who identified these objects and gave us a better understanding of their time period and their use as well as insight into the activities of the people living in this area in our ancient past.

JALNA Revisited:

The 85th Anniversary of Mazo de la Roche's Award Winning Novel opened on January 20 and will continue until June 29 in the Anchorage at Bradley Museum. Mazo de la Roche wrote her

ground-breaking novel, Jalna, while living in Clarkson in 1927. The novel was considered "risqué" but won the Atlantic Monthly Prize award and propelled Mazo de la Roche into the spotlight changing her life forever. It was an international best seller with more than 12 million copies sold and it is still in print. The saga of the Whiteoaks family continued on with 15 installments. There is a soon to be released documentary about Mazo de la Roche shot partially at Benares Historic House. This display celebrates this milestone anniversary discussing the success of her writings, how her fame affected her life and her close ties to Mississauga.

Oriental Influence

will be exhibited at Benares Visitor Centre until mid-April 2012. The Harris family of Benares, and in particular Annie Harris Sayers, had an interest in the "Far East".

This interest may have been fostered by the many gifts received from her cousin and Chinese art collector, Percy Sutherland, who worked for the Canadian Pacific Railway for their ocean-going service

between Vancouver, Hong Kong, Japan and China. This exhibition will highlight many of the oriental artifacts in the collection cherished by the Harris family as well as information on a Korean orphanage supported by Annie Harris Sayers.

When in Rome...When in Mississauga...

Joshua Pollard Senior lived in the 1800's and resided in Toronto Township, now known as the City of Mississauga. Originally born in Boston, Mass he settled here when he gained possession of land. He also applied for and gained a permit to open an inn and eventually was appointed as a tax collector for this area. He was married three times and fathered twelve children, some of whom did not live for long. In the War of 1812 Pollard joined Loyalist forces, aimed his gun at his own fellow Americans and fought alongside Sir Isaac Brock. When Brock was fatally shot on the battlefield, it was reportedly Pollard who held "the great man's hat". Joshua Pollard, a citizen from this part of the country, was therefore present at a key moment of our nation's history. If you visit the Canadian War Museum in Ottawa today, the uniform that Brock wore when he died, with the fatal bullet hole evident, is on display for all to see.


Recently at an event held at the Bradley House Museum and sponsored by Heritage Mississauga, we were able to honour the memory of Pollard and other fascinating individuals. In a role-playing exercise, groups of people toured the site and were "engaged" in discussions with people from our historical past. Bringing to life those from the past, we relived the stories and people that are the composite of our local and national history. Over the summer I had the great opportunity to travel extensively over Italy, Greece and my own land of heritage, the island of Malta. I took special time and great care to visit key historic and World Heritage designated sites. In one twentyfour hour period I stood in the shadow of Rome's Coliseum and next

to the Acropolis on the Parthenon in Athens. Also, during my trip with great pride I walked amongst what is known as the oldest free standing temple in the world- the Ggantija (Giants) Temple in Gozo, Malta which happens to be in the hometown and birthplace of my parents. In a matter of a few short weeks I soaked in the history that extended from the Neolithic times, to the Ancient Greeks and the Roman Empire and also saw the great works of architecture and art from the Renaissance period of our world history.

Coming back to Mississauga I could not help but be just as enthralled with our own local history. We may not have the distinction of being the stewards of ancient monuments but our past and our story are equally as fascinating and no less important. When we take the time and effort to "rub the dust" off of the past, we meet interesting people like Joshua Pollard. We get an understanding of the hardships they faced. We understand that our commonality is that we are all in a continual and universal struggle to survive economically in our respective times and to confer upon our children better futures and good fortune.

If we consider the great maxim of the environmental movement, they tell us to "think globally by acting locally…" then

certainly in the context of museums and heritage we can say that to understand our collective world history we should also become strong patrons of our own local history. After my recent experiences, I certainly would say that before you go to Rome visit Benares Historic House. Before you climb the Parthenon walk the lawns of Bradley Museum and Leslie Log House. Know where you come from locally before you board the airplane to explore other lands. Get to know people like Pollard before you walk past the destroyed palaces of the Roman Emperors. In the final analysis it is all about a love and understanding of history. Knowing where you come from and who walked on this soil before you is an important aspect of living in the City of Mississauga.

Heritage Happenings from Heritage Mississauga

First and foremost, thank you to the dedicated staff and volunteers at the Museums of Mississauga and Heritage Mississauga for partnering with us to present our 10th annual Haunted Mississauga heritage tour, which this year took place at the Bradley Museum on October 21st. Our story theme this year was a highly interactive and entertaining look at local history, set in October of 1811, on the eve of the War of 1812. In the office we continue to work on several research projects. In partnership with the University of Toronto Mississauga internship program, we have an ongoing research project documenting the historical connections between Mississauga (formerly Toronto Township) and the War of 1812. We also have a project in consultation with Professor Donald Smith, documenting the Credit Mission

Village site between 1847 and 1900. Another project is focused on documenting some of our more modern history in terms of Mississauga's suburban development. primarily focused on the emergence of the Hiawatha-on-the-Lake and Park Roval subdivisions. Work is also ongoing on the "Remember Our Fallen" research project, which is focusing on the documentation of Mississauga's fallen soldiers. Lastly, we are in the early stages of engaging residents of Lorne Park Estates in documenting the heritage buildings and history of this unique and special part of Mississauga, Please visit our website over the coming months for more information as our research and documentation continues: www.heritagemississauga.com.

Looking ahead to 2012, we start the New Year focused on the bicentennial of the War of 1812. In partnership with the Region of Peel Heritage Complex, Heritage Mississauga is delighted to host the War of 1812 travelling exhibit from the Archives of Ontario from January 10th until February 24th, 2012. This free exhibit will open on Tuesday, January 10th, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. The Archives of Ontario's War of 1812 travelling exhibit sheds light on formative events in the history of Ontario. The War of 1812 had long-term effects on the economic, social and political life of the province. This exhibit is a history resource that showcases some of the personalities and locations that played a role in the war,

and explores the events of that conflict using the correspondence and diaries of those who lived it. Their words are illustrated with artwork, maps and photographs from the holdings of the Archives, many being made widely available for the first time. We invite you to explore this exhibit and learn about the War of 1812 in Upper Canada.

This is certainly an interesting time of contrasts to be working in the museum world! Sadly, in nearby municipalities there has been talk of closing down longestablished museums both as a costcutting measure and because there seems to be a diminished appreciation of the value and sense of place that museums can offer to a community. At the same time, we delight in another community's successes in truly celebrating their history with the November opening of the vibrant, new Region of Waterloo Museum!

We're somewhere in between, with the Museums of Mississauga growing in profile and community engagement, opening a third site - Leslie Log House last year. We have solid plans in place to grow our collections and to plan and build an Artifact Preservation Centre and we are looking ahead to a future museum that celebrates our more than 10,000 year history. We are inspired by the excellent support, hard work and commitment of the members of the Museums of Mississauga Advisory Committee, the Friends of the Museums of Mississauga Board of Directors and our active volunteers.

At the same time, like everyone else, we do deal with the daily reality of budget pressures and limited staff resources, trying to do more with less. It is within this context that the Museums and the larger Culture Division that we are a part of, recently underwent a reorganization with the intent of improving efficiencies, creating strong synchronicities among the various areas in the Division and re-inspiring all of us to take a fresh look at how best to grow in the future.

The specific impacts on the Museums include the following changes:

- Creation of a more **formalized contract position** of "Lead Historic Interpreter". The goal is to provide more cohesive support and engagement of our very important team of front-line historic interpreters. **Lindsay Doren** has been appointed Acting Lead Historic Interpreter;
- Stephanie Meeuwse, Museums Collections and Exhibit Supervisor and Alexandra Benedikt, Acting Collections Assistant have moved to the office at Benares Visitor Centre, a quieter location close to the Benares Collection Storage space. Tracy Oliveira will be returning from her Maternity Leave in April to resume her position as Collections Assistant;
- Kelly Kubik, Museums Community Program Supervisor and Merri Fergusson, Acting Museums Education Program Supervisor have moved to the Anchorage, Bradley Museum to be closer

to the administrative and customer service centre of the Museums;

- Lobna Thakib, who has been responsible for the great improvements in the quality and impact of our promotional materials (hence the doubling of our group bookings this fall) is sadly leaving the Museums to take on a similar task for the Culture Division as a whole. Thankfully, she'll continue to manage our Museums promotions from her new position within the Culture office at the Central Library;
- The Museums are now part of the new Cultural Operations Section of the Culture Division, along with our colleagues in Arts and Culture Programs, the Film and TV Office and Meadowvale Theatre; reporting to the new Manager of Cultural Operations, Andrew Whittemore and;
- We have confirmed our commitment to increasing both community engagement and revenue generation through creative and innovative approaches to being Mississauga's Museums. Our top priority will be working with the Friends of the Museums on the two new audience development initiatives supported by grants received through the Community Foundation of Mississauga (Museums + Art Library Pass Program) and SUNCOR Museums of Mississauga "High Risk" Engagement Project

It is an exciting time of changes and challenges, both good things for any individual or organization!

REBEL ART AND IDEAS

In 2007, a proclamation was made for a National Youth Week on May 1 to 7 each year. Following this thinking, a new National Youth Arts Week initiative was recently launched by the Arts Network www.artsnetwork.ca, and it will be taking place for the first time on May 1 to 7, 2012. The City of Mississauga's Culture Division is supporting youth and partner organizations to present unique events for National Youth Arts Week in Mississauga.

Heritage Mississauga and the Culture Division are highlighting a route that cuts across the city to provide a diverse view of cultures, lifestyles and urban densities. The route travels along Dundas, Burnhamthorpe, Mississauga and Lakeshore Roads and up Winston Churchill Boulevard, passing many key nodes including the Hurontario and Dundas intersection, Mississauga Celebration Square, Riverwood Park, University of Toronto Mississauga campus and the lake shore. This route marks a heritage celebration, as it was used in 1837 by William Lyon Mackenzie to escape the failed Rebellion that took place 175 years ago. Mackenzie's flight from authorities took him through historic Mississauga following a rebel uprising, and the Rebellion of 1837 has become a famed part of Canada's history. Themed "Rebel" in Mississauga, youth arts week events will be focused along this route.

All programs share a unique vision of civic engagement, cultural activism and mentorship and seek volunteers to engage youth and adults alike across all of our communities and neighbourhoods in the city.

The week promises music, heritage discussions, inspiring words, art and dance. For instance, the Culture Division will be having an annual Dance Recital at the Living Arts Centre on Tuesday, May 15th. A sneak preview performance will be held during National Youth Arts Week. The dancers in this event range from as young as five years old (Recital Little Ballerina Program) to adult (Recital Tap), and is suitable to wide audiences.
