THE COMMUNITY COMMITS FUNDING FOR YOUTH PLAY

Introduction:

According to Play Works, criteria 7 states that the community must support youth play through funding. Mississauga believes that all youth should have an equal opportunity for youth play, despite of their financial circumstance. Organizations should provide funding in order for most programs to be at a minimal affordable cost, if not free. There are several funding sources that support youth play. Local service agencies and municipal agencies place policies that determine and reflect the investments. Other groups such as sports groups or the business community also play a role in funding these activities. The promotion of these events also happens through these groups, along with the school systems. In addition the community also spends the funding towards long-term development, such as parks, studios, and recreation centers (basketball courts, tennis courts, etc). To prove that the city of Mississauga successfully meets this criterion, several organizations validating this criterion and documentations received from youth will be presented throughout this report.

How does the community of Mississauga commit funding for youth play?

Several programs in Mississauga work to commit funding for youth activities in order to help youth feel accepted in the community as well as provide a basis for them to be seen as constructive citizens of the Mississauga community. To prove this criterion successful, numerous organizations and community programs were researched and then were either interviewed or visited for an in-depth analysis of their role in funding youth activities.

There is an extensive range of organizations that play an active role in creating funds for youth play. One of these organizations is "**United Way - Youth in Action Grants**", which is a funding program established to promote youth to become more involved in their community, as well as raise awareness concerning issues among youth in Mississauga (Ref 7-1). United Way collects funds from the community and invests them in youth programs as well as in initiatives to tackle social issues among youth. United Way invests in 99 programs and services, done through collaborating with other funding partners and community stakeholders. The "Youth in Action grants" are a one-time prospect centered on youth-led projects that help the youth to address community

issues through their vision. Youth ages 14-24 can apply for this grant and receive approximately \$2,000/project as requested. As seen in the appendix, the recipients of the "Youth in Action Grant" of 2009/2010 are listed, of which include "Youth making a Difference Workshop" and "Youth Opportunities through Community." While the organization was being researched, our group came upon an application for the 2011 funding proposal which indicates an amount of \$20,000 available for distribution in which individuals from 14-24 are encouraged to participate. The proposal also outlines how events will succeed in a "Youth Campaign" as well as how to generate the greatest funds through businesses. Also included in the appendix is a poster for an awards presentation, which promotes fundraising events, organized by youth to create an atmosphere of competition and involvement as to who collects the most funds (Also organized by United Way). After going through the different ways through which United Way's Youth in Action Grants operate, we learned that it plays a large role nationally and locally in providing youth with the best experience in activities through adequate funding to organizations.

In Addition, the "**Loblaws Grants for Youth**" is a program that works together with other organizations across the country to provide an encouraging environment for youth while raising awareness regarding healthy living and ways to maintain a healthy lifestyle. A grant such as the "Loblaw Companies Limited after School Grant" is established to provide up to \$5,000 in funding for healthy activities for youth after-school. While going through the flyers and posters at Loblaws, our group came upon several ways in which Loblaw supports youth play. In 2010, Loblaw Companies After-School Grant was \$250,000 for kids through elementary school through high school. The 2011 proposal states funding for each organization participating in the program is \$5000. This will allow the organizations to establish events and programs in which youth can access innovative recreational programs after 3:30pm. Our group contacted the Loblaw investment coordinator, Nicole Donaldson, to see as to which organizations the grant money is given to and what youth activities are promoted through these organizations. The response that we received was *"the goal of the Loblaw Grants and charities such as the Presidents Choice Children's Charity provide a framework for physical activities to take place in a supportive environment, where all youth can participate. Grants are provided to organizations such as YMCA Canada, Big Brothers, Big Sisters of Canada etc. These organizations then decide as to how they use the grant money to help youth, whether it be short-term or long-term"* (Nicole Donaldson).

Furthermore, **JumpStart**, a program created by Canadian Tire, strives to remove barriers so that the youth can participate and enjoy organized recreational activities (7-5). JumpStart carries on this program through donations and sponsorships from a variety of sources. These include a wide variety of organizations such as government partners who are in support of youth play, business partners who raise money through funding the events, and customers who merely donate in the memory of their loved ones. As

seen on the JumpStart website there are several options for individuals from the community to choose from, through which they want to contribute by donating. These options include, fundraising online, donating, finding a fundraiser and hosting an event. After getting in contact with the JumpStart representatives, we found that they provide different tools, resources and ideas through which individuals can raise funds. One of the events that JumpStart hosts is the annual "JumpStart Day"; in this program, all Canadian Tire, Mark's and Gas+ locations ask customers to donate \$1.00 along with their purchase for funding for youth play. This year, the event was held on May 28th, 2011 and the funding allowed 30,000 children and youth participate in summer games and events from which a considerable amount would not be able to afford it otherwise. As seen in the Appendix, the website shows how JumpStart uses different methods to reach out to community members in order to attain funds and promote upcoming events in the community. Funding from JumpStart is provided to cover registration fees, transportations costs and equipment cost for youth through the ages of 4-18 years old. The most beneficial aspect of JumpStart is that it is a program created to allow all youth, regardless of social status, to participate in youth activities and to eradicate the barriers holding them back. Furthermore, funds acquired by the JumpStart programs are acquired through sponsors such as CIBC, Rogers TV, Solace, Shell Lubricants and many more.

The **Jerry Love fund** is another city-run program named after Mississauga's former director of recreation (Ref 7-2). It is a fund that raises thousands of dollars each year to help children and youth in the community enjoy and participate in different recreational activities. These activities can include skating, dancing, sports and many others. About 12,000 youth are supported through these funds, which are raised through different ways. Individuals can donate for this charity online and organizations can also apply for funds online. While our group was researching this particular program, we found that it is one of the oldest programs created to facilitate youth programs. We found that through time different business have reached out to organize events to raise funds of the program. In 2010 Scotiabank's Scotia McLeod hosted a Golf Country Club, which raised \$24,000. Other businesses such as Pepsi donated 25,000 to the program as well. In addition to those sources, the foundation also provides an individual's to donate by setting a rule that if anyone donates \$20 or more, they receive a receipt for income purposes and also tax deductible.

Lastly, **Trillium** is another foundation that provides funding and the basis for organizations to invest in youth play (Ref 7-3). The funding by Ontario Trillium Foundation is distributed through three granting programs to not-for-profit and charitable organizations. These include Community Program, Province-Wide program and Future Fund. The Community Program is established for activities that takes place and has an effect within the local community. 80% of the OFT funding goes toward Community Grants such as those for the Mississauga community. Through this organization, the

foundation makes up to \$375,000/5 years of grant money. In addition the other relevant funds provided by Trillium to youth play are Future Fund, which has around \$2 million assigned to focus on Ontario's futures. The goals to be achieved from this fund are; providing entrepreneurial skill development programs for youth so that they can become more involved. OTF has granted millions of dollars to different organizations to reach out to youth, and help them participate in educational and technological activities. What our group found different and interesting concerning OTF is that they promote and increase youth engagement grants to northern and rural areas where of a location where minority youth are deprived to youth play and activities. In addition they are working to develop tools through which one can evaluate how much a youth is engaged in an activity, and to which areas additional funding needs to be provided.

ADDITIONAL SUPPORTING EVIDENCE:

- **Affiliated Group Liaison Policy-** City policy provides non profit groups with a recreation purpose direct support. This support includes a designated staff liaison, preferred booking and facility rental assistance, liability insurance, program and services promotion, connect with the community, group and volunteer development. Levels of support may vary depending on the group. High priority is given to youth initiatives.
- **City's Sponsorship Unit-** Offers support to Community groups and staff liaisons in sourcing sponsorship opportunities. Provides training and tools for Community groups to secure sponsorships and creates awareness in the corporate sector regarding projects and opportunities.
- **United Way of Peel-** Offers support to 53 community organizations. Many of which offer programs to youth. Recipients include Big Brothers and Sisters of Peel, Nexus Youth Services, Our Place Peel, Boys and Girls Club of Peel, Peel Youth Network, Associated Youth Services, African Community Services, Erin Mills Youth Outreach, Dixie-Bloor Neighborhood Services, Rapport Youth Services, Community Living, Elizabeth Fry Society, Indian Rainbow, Intercultural, Malton Neighborhood Services, Vita Centre. In 2010, \$9.7 million was invested in Community Fund in programs, services and initiatives (Reference 7-1).
- **Jerry Love Children's Fund-** A subsidy program that provides opportunities for play for both children and youth in City recreation programs. In 2010, \$67,567 was raised and supported 610 children and youth for a total of 623 registrations. (Reference 7-2)
- **Trillium Granting Program-** In 2010-2011 a total of over \$2.5 million was invested for youth initiatives in Peel. In 2011-2012, over \$1.1 million was distributed (Reference 7-3)
- **Active Assist-** Low income families receive \$275 (for every family member) to use towards registered City of Mississauga programs and/or memberships. From May 5, 2009- June 30th, 2010 984 youth were granted funds and 75% of these

youth used over 50% of this allowance towards registered programs (54% of these used over 75% of their funds). (Ref 7-4)

- **Community Foundation of Mississauga**- An organization that pools charitable gifts and distributes funds to a wide range of local initiatives including youth programs. 2010 Cumulative grants to organizations serving Children and Youth was \$914,000 (Reference 7-5)
- **City of Mississauga District Community Development Funds**- Designated to community based program initiatives (approximately \$50,000 annually) out of the Recreation & Parks budget, including the Together for Youth Fund (Cawthra Community Specific)
- **Mayor's Gala, Mayor's Golf Tournament**- Proceeds support the Mississauga Arts Council, Living Arts Centre and Community Art Groups. Examples of youth recipients have been the Mississauga Youth Choir and the Mississauga Youth Orchestra, Provides funding also for various community groups. Youth group recipients include the Mayor's Youth Advisory. To date, the Gala has raised over \$4 million dollars and in 2010 the Golf Tournament raised \$120,000 (Reference 7-6)
- **YMCA**- They are funded through a variety of donations, government support and grants. In 2010 YMCA of GTA (which includes Mississauga), had revenue of \$178 million and expenses of \$179 million. In addition, provide support to families who may not be able to afford their membership. It is funded through the YMCA Strong Kids Campaign (Reference 7-7).
- **City of Mississauga Corporate Grant Program** – The program allows local non-profit agencies to apply for grant opportunities. In 2011, \$13,600 was awarded to Big Brothers Big Sisters of Peel, \$10,500 was awarded to Community Living Mississauga, \$35,500 was awarded to Nexus Youth Services – for a total of approximately \$60,000 (Reference 7-8)
- **Mississauga Hockey League**- Play- More Program- assists players with financial restraints (Reference 7-9).
- **Corporate support for youth in Mississauga**- It is very strong with some notable companies, including Wal-Mart- AT PLAY program, Sears, Astrazeneca, Tim Horton's – Holiday skate and swim programs and Earn a Bike Program, General Mills, Royal Bank, TD, Scotia Bank, Sport Chek- Power of Sport, Canadian Tire Jump Start Foundation (more than \$17 million raised in Canada), Fresh Air Fund (distributed \$10, 000), etc. (Reference 7-10)
- **Festival support for youth initiatives**- Major festivals such as My Mississauga, Mississauga Waterfront Festival, Southside Blues & Jazz, Carassauga and the Bread and Honey Festival dedicate funding for youth play activity and performances. Festivals also donate money from their fundraisers back to the community. For example, Southside Blues and Jazz Festival donated over \$45 000 to high school music programs within the community.

- **Community Churches and Cultural Centres-** Donate space, equipment and staff resources to support youth play.
- **Nexus Youth Services** – Raises funds through a variety of sources (Region of Peel, Ministry of Children & Youth, etc). Their 2010-2011 fiscal year saw revenues of \$493,082 and operating costs of \$472,095 (References 7-11)
- **Vita Center-** Hosts several opportunities for fund raising. For example, their Trivia night raise \$4,300 (Reference 7-12)
- **Service Clubs-** There are 45 active service clubs in Mississauga. Most have supported youth at play directed through program support, equipment, sponsored individual youth and have championed the cause for other community groups on grant applications such as the Streetsville Kinsmen that have championed the Action Sport Coalitions skateboard park initiatives. In 2010, the Rotary Club of Mississauga presented Vita Center with a cheque for \$1,000 at Christmas to help buy diapers. (Reference 7-13)
- **Peel Children's Centre** – Royal Bank of Canada issued a cheque for \$45,000 in 2010 (Reference 7-14)
- **United Way Youth In Action Grant** – In 2010, grants totaling \$20,000 were issued to 11 youth-led projects in Peel (Reference 7-15). Some examples include the Project One: Operation Inspire for \$1,838 (Reference Video) and the RHYTHM program for \$1,870 (Reference Video)
- **The Ontario's Youth Opportunities Program** – Sri-Lanken Community Services and Malton Neighbourhood Services each received \$40,000 while India Rainbow Community Services of Peel received \$38,800. (Reference 7-16)
- **The Mississauga Youth Plan** – The plan commits ongoing funding to youth programs and initiatives in the City. In 2011, \$382,900 was budgeted in Recreation & Parks for Youth Plan outcomes. (Reference 7-18)

Our Community

More than 1.2 million people live in Peel region, which includes Mississauga, Brampton and Caledon. Ours is one of the fastest growing communities in Canada. We enjoy tremendous diversity, with immigrants making up close to half the population. More than 90 distinct ethnic groups live in Peel and more than 60 different languages are spoken.

However, our community faces several challenges. For example:

- 1 in 7 people live in poverty
- In recent years domestic abuse in Peel Region has risen by 20 per cent
- Almost 25 per cent of Peel's population will experience one or more mental disorders in their lifetime.
- As many as 1 in 10 seniors are victims of abuse. In most cases their abuser is someone close to them.
- Approximately 171,030 Peel residents (1 in 7) are living with a visible or non-visible disability.
- Peel has the longest waiting list for affordable housing in the province, with more than 13,500 households waiting for an available unit. For families applying today the wait can be 20 years.
- More than 160,000 youth live in Peel but there's only one 12-bed emergency youth shelter. More than half the youth who turn to the shelter have been abused and more than 90 per cent come from broken homes.

The Community Fund

When you give to United Way, your money goes into the Community Fund — the pool of donations that are not directed to other registered charities. Just 13.4% of our total revenue is spent on fundraising, which includes a portion of our operating costs. The Community Fund supports a vital network of social services, helps build strong agencies, fosters community partnerships focused on collective action, supports our work as an advocate for social change, and invests in initiatives that provide economic opportunities and the chance to participate in the life of our community.

Coping with challenges and thriving in the face of tough times and constant change takes resilience. United Way builds resilience in individuals, families and communities by taking action in four areas:

- Provide grants that support the development and operation of eight social purpose enterprises, providing employment and training to vulnerable people at risk of falling into poverty
- Enable United Way to speak out with a strong voice for social change

Youth in Action Grants – Funding Guidelines

DEADLINE FOR APPLICATION: FRIDAY SEPTEMBER 30, 2011

Youth are our community's most powerful and effective volunteers, serving our community in varied and helpful ways. United Way of Peel Region and the Region of Peel are committed to partnering with youth to address key social issues in our community. United Way of Peel Region and the Region of Peel believe that both youth and young adults are instrumental in creating positive, measureable and lasting changes.

Youth in Action is a one-time grant opportunity focused on youth-led projects that offer creative youth-initiated ideas to address community issues in Peel Region. Youth and/or groups of youth between the ages of 14 and 24 are encouraged to submit an application. Requests can be made for up to \$2,000 per project. A total of \$20,000 funded by United Way of Peel Region and the Region of Peel is available for distribution through this granting opportunity.

Rationale:

Youth are a high priority; they have both important and unique assets and needs that require attention and support. According to the 2006 census, 14.1% of Peel's population is made up of youth between the ages of 15 and 24. This segment of our population can bring many fresh insights and inspired solutions to community issues. In many ways, youth and youth led organizations are best-positioned to know what will work for other youth in our community (Roots of Youth Violence Report, 2008). Youth who feel excluded become disengaged and are particularly at risk. Offering alternatives and ways for youth to become engaged at the neighbourhood level is a key element to youth engagement. It is important to provide support to youth themselves so that they can participate in and provide leadership, if they so desire, to create the opportunities and solutions for their neighbourhoods while best using their own skills.

The purpose of the Youth in Action grant program is to:

- Motivate and encourage youth to become involved in their communities in Peel Region
- To seek and empower youth leadership within neighbourhoods in Peel Region
- Raise awareness and inspire change regarding issues that are of interest to youth in Peel such as civic action, healthy living, immigration, poverty, violence, mental health and disability

Key Criteria:

To be considered for funding, projects must:

1. Focus on achieving one or more of the following outcomes:
 - Youth have increased positive social skills and healthy lifestyles, including increased awareness about substance abuse
 - Youth have increased positive social skills to succeed, respect diversity, personal empowerment and confidence
 - Increased youth engagement, leadership opportunities, and inclusion in their families, schools and communities

2. Reflect genuine youth volunteer ownership and leadership in their design, implementation and evaluation;
3. Provide a clear and achievable action and evaluation plan, clearly defining the outcome(s) that the project is striving to achieve;
4. Build and strengthen skills and abilities of youth involved with the project;
5. Clearly benefit the local community as well as support neighbourhood development through increasing youth and resident participation in neighbourhood activities, and improving the quality of neighbourhood life;
6. Be inclusive and accessible to all (i.e. language and/or cultural diversity, physical accessibility, financial costs and transportation)

What project ideas are not eligible?

- Projects that are for youth but not initiated or led by youth
- Membership fees in clubs and organizations
- Fundraising projects or donations to other groups or organizations, religious groups or political organizations
- Alcoholic beverages
- Fines and penalties
- Purchase of large scale capital assets/technology
- Overnight camps/workshops

Who Can Apply?

Youth aged 14 to 24 who have great ideas on how to develop and promote youth involvement in their community in Peel Region:

- Youth that create awareness and change about youth issues
- Youth that create opportunities for, and to develop, youth leadership
- Youth that enable youth to become involved and active in their community
- Youth that enable youth to realize their potential

All applicants must work with a Sponsoring Organization.

What is a Sponsoring Organization?

A Sponsoring Organization is a registered charitable organization. United Way of Peel Region and the Region of Peel can only provide grants to registered charities. Projects need a Sponsoring Organization that can provide their registered charitable number on the grant application form. The Sponsoring Organization receives the funds on the youth/youth group's behalf and is accountable for the funding. It is strongly recommended that you contact potential sponsoring organizations well in advance to discuss and secure their support for your project.

<p>Intergenerational Computer Project: A project that brings together youth and seniors to have the opportunity to learn from one another and share in meaningful activities; computer program and leisure activities exchange.</p>
<p>Meals with Love: This project aims to bring about positive change among low-income families in the Peel Region, in need of healthy food. Delivery of 50 food hampers with nutritious and fresh foods along with a component for healthy eating education.</p>
<p>Project ONE: Operation INSPIRE: This project will run urban/hip hop dance lessons to teach the youth in the local community the basics of how to dance, it will also include a mentoring component after each lesson.</p>
<p>Sigma A Beats Program: This project will work with youth in Unit A in the Roy McMurtry Youth Detention Facility in Brampton. They will engage music teachers and a hip hop lab to learn the fundamentals of music, and how to produce it. "The future is bright because we have such passionate young volunteers to draw inspiration from," she said.

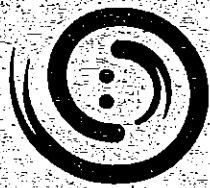
This year, youth-led campaigns across Peel raised more than \$10,500 for United Way of Peel. The awards will be presented to the winners at their schools over the next few weeks.

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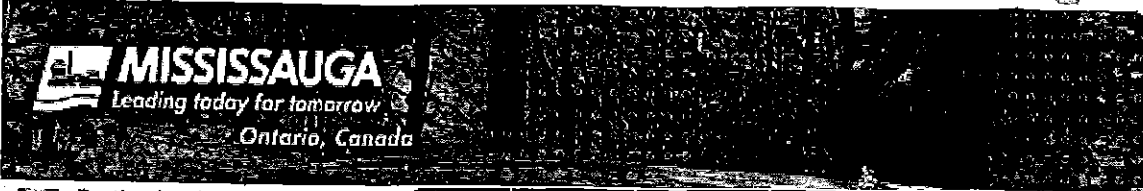

Eligibility

All children's recreation programs that are operated by Mississauga Recreation and Parks are eligible for subsidy. The subsidization program is restricted to residents of Mississauga 15 years of age and under. Subsidy does not include semi private or private lessons.

Eligible children may receive a subsidy for 1 program OR 1 session of camp per calendar year. The maximum amount of

subsidy for any program or session is **\$128**. Since funds are limited the agency or parent/guardian will be required to pay the difference for any program exceeding the \$128 maximum. Subsidy does not include extra costs associated with program.

In order for a child to be approved for a program subsidy, one of the following referral documents must be received by the Mississauga Recreation and Parks Customer Service Centre along with the appropriate registration form and any additional fees required to equal the cost of the program:

- a) **"Referral for Subsidy"** Qualified staff from a Social Service Agency such as Community Living Mississauga (CLM), the Children's Aid Society complete a subsidy form for registered clients with that agency who they deem to have financial hardship. The worker is not required to disclose any financial details (i.e. annual income) of the family on the referral form but is indicating that the family is in need of financial assistance in order for their child to participate. The form must be completed for all programs including aquatic programs and Fitness memberships and must be sent with the appropriate program Recreation and Parks registration forms.

- b) **A photocopy of monthly "Statement of Assistance"** Qualified staff from a Social Service Agency such as Community Living Mississauga (CLM), the Children's Aid Society complete a subsidy form for registered clients with that agency who they deem to have financial hardship. The worker is not required to disclose any financial details (i.e. annual income) of the family on the referral form but is indicating that the family is in need of financial assistance in order for their child to participate. The form must be completed for all programs including aquatic programs and Fitness memberships and must be sent with the appropriate program Recreation and Parks registration forms.

Please note that recreation programs are filled on a first come, first served basis, so we encourage you to submit requests early.

Background

To Jerry Love, Mississauga's former Director of Recreation, making recreation opportunities available to all of the community's children was literally a labour of love.

Before retiring in 1991, Jerry spent 35 years offering Mississauga's children the recreation programs that best met their physical and social needs. He also realized that many families, due to financial constraints, couldn't afford to enrol their children in municipally operated recreation programs.

Jerry was a major advocate behind a charitable fund that let children, despite their family finances, participate in the City's wide range of recreation programs. When Jerry retired, Mayor Hazel McCallion honoured his efforts by renaming the fund after him: the Jerry Love Children's Fund, a truly appropriate designation.

This new multi-disciplinary centre, proposed for 2012, will provide a more coordinated response to victims of abuse in Peel region.

Mississauga Blues Rugby Club

\$15,000 over one year to purchase basic rugby equipment to allow more players to participate in the sport. By owning its own equipment, the club will become more sustainable and provide physical activity opportunities across different age ranges and locations.

Mississauga Canoe Club

\$46,000 over one year to enhance the safety of the sport of CanoeKayak and make it accessible to more people in Mississauga, especially for those with intellectual and physical disabilities.

Groups get Trillium cash

Eight Mississauga organizations will receive more than \$1 million in the latest round of grants handed by the Ontario Trillium Foundation.

The successful recipients are:

- the Dixie Bloor Neighbourhood Drop-In Centre;
- the Square One Older Adult Centre;
- the Mississauga Girls Hockey League;
- the Mississauga Ramblers Cricket Sports & Cultural Club;
- the Mississauga-Meadowvale Community Support Fund;
- the Springfield Tennis Club;
- the Oplenac Serbian Cultural Association of Metropolitan Toronto & Mississauga;
- and, the Citizens for the Advancement of Community Development.

The largest grant went to Dixie Bloor Neighbourhood Drop-In Centre, which is getting \$375,000 over five years to offer a wide range of culturally-specific recreational opportunities for newcomer youth or those who may be isolated from age-appropriate activities in this high-needs neighbourhood.

The second largest grant went to the Square One Older Adult Centre, which will receive \$219,000 over three years to expand the programming in northwest Mississauga.

On the sports front, the Mississauga Girls Hockey League and the Mississauga Ramblers received \$200,000 and \$99,700 respectively.

"The money will be used by our club to purchase ground maintenance equipment and to provide practice areas to increase the number of players," said Ramblers spokesman Surinder Puri.

The grants were announced on Nov. 30. More than \$35.7 million in Trillium grants were awarded to 491 province-wide groups.

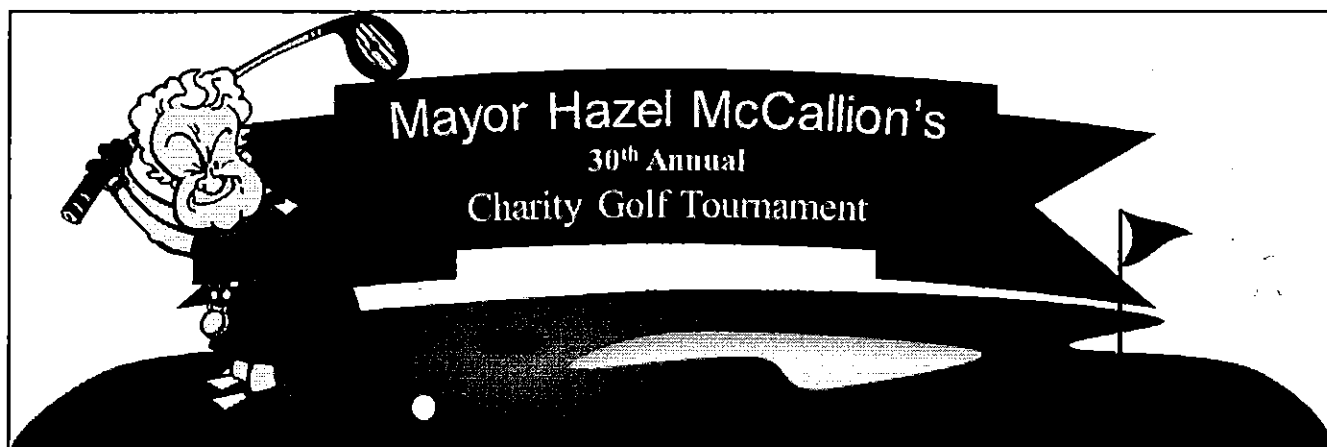

Golf Tournament History

It was 30 years ago, before fund raising golf tournaments were even popular when Mississauga planner John Rogers and the late Rick Mortensen decided to hold an annual golf tournament in Mayor Hazel McCallion's name.

Mayor Hazel agreed on one condition, that is, all proceeds go to local charities. Since then, more than \$2 million have been distributed to more than 300 charities.

The tournament, traditionally the second Thursday of September, was originally held at Derrydale Golf Club, with all green fees waived by owner Jim Holmes. Jim hosted the tournament for 20 years until it was moved to City-owned BraeBen Golf Course when Derrydale downsized to an executive nine-hole course.

Actually, on two occasions the tournament was held elsewhere to accommodate a larger registration. In 1993, Credit Valley Golf Club hosted a special tournament and with reduced fees the tournament netted \$300,000 for the then, new University of Toronto Mississauga campus.

The 25th anniversary milestone tournament was held at Kaneff-owned Lionhead Golf Club to allow for 288 golfers and a banquet for 350 guests – double the size of the usual tournament. That year, more than \$120,000 was raised for Mississauga charities.

The tournament has its own logo, a cartoon of Hazel golfing conceived and produced by well known Canadian cartoonist Steve Nease. A life size wooden cutout of the logo was made which allowed all golfers to have their photo taken with a golfing "Hazel".

A majority of the money raised over the years has been donated by generous sponsors. Laurie Williamson of Laurie Williamson Motors has been a sponsor from the beginning by providing a "hole-in-one car" which was finally won by a lucky golfer in 2006.

The tournament is the prime fundraiser for The Hazel McCallion Charitable Fund, a federally registered charity that disperses the proceeds of the golf tournament through a volunteer board of directors. The fund also accepts and has received outside donations.

Over the years, the Charitable Fund has taken great care to help as many worthwhile causes as possible with special attention to organizations that provide support, encouragement and opportunities to children and youth in Mississauga.

John Rogers is the president of the Fund; Gerry Townsend serves as Treasurer and Ron Lenyk is Vice President.

The Fund accepts requests from all area charities. Volunteer board members meet four times a year to decide where funds should be allocated. The Fund is also audited by an outside accounting firm.

The tournament's extraordinary gift for giving to those in need was particularly acknowledged by the Governor General in 2005 when Hazel was bestowed with The Order of Canada.

For the past eight years, Ron Lenyk has chaired the tournament although John Rogers has remained with the committee throughout making his tenure 30 years – 22 as Chair. Currently in addition to John and Ron, Shalini Alleluia, Gerry Townsend, Ron Starr, Doug Fowles, Jim Murray, Michael Parsons and Peter McCallion make up the volunteer golf committee.

The same standards implemented from the beginning and upheld by Mayor Hazel apply to each tournament: namely, that support is gathered through leadership and integrity, volunteers are encouraged and welcomed, and most of all, fiscal restraint and accountability are never negotiable.

Mississauga gala grows with city

Tonight marks the 25th anniversary of Mississauga's Mayor's Gala.

The event has raised more than \$4 million for community issues, and was born out of the unlikeliest of reasons — a disappointment over the then recently constructed City Hall.

From the inside, it is a magnificent structure with a stunning Great Hall, but from the outside it looks like home to Hell. On top of the building sits what looks to be a guard tower.

Don Cherry once said he thought the building was beautiful, but added he was from Kingston where the most famous achievement is a penitentiary.

The original idea behind holding the gala was to gather business and community leaders for a party to show off the city and raise money for a proposed new arts and performance centre.

The concept was pitched to Mayor Hazel McCallion who was eagerly enthusiastic as long as no taxpayer money was used.

People shelled out \$300 — a heavy price for the time — and dined under a tent in the Civic Square seated on plastic chairs, moving into the Great Hall where they danced.

The event moved to the Delta Meadowvale Hotel shortly thereafter, where it remained for seven years until shifting to the newly completed Living Arts Centre.

As Mississauga grew the gala grew with it, mirroring the maturation of the city — from a tent to a hotel to a truly magnificent structure.

The Mayor's Gala has also faced criticism from those who say it is not inclusive, that it's an event reserved for those who have the means to afford the now \$500 ticket.

They're right, it's not available to all.

Nor is a Leafs' hockey game, or a Barbra Streisand concert, or any number of fundraisers held on any given night across the city. The gala has raised significant funds and the city's profile.

"Over the years, many of North America's top performers have graced our stage and helped put Mississauga on the national and international media," said gala committee member Ron Duquette.

Television host and entertainer Regis Philbin performed at one gala, and on several occasions afterward, spoke highly of the city and McCallion.

Other performers have included Burton Cummings, Bill Cosby and Paul Anka, one of the few entertainers who could outperform Hazel. And I don't mean politically. Anka serenaded her from the stage. I was hoping he would sing his hit song (You Baby).

Aretha Franklin threatened to walk off the stage after several songs if the air conditioning wasn't adjusted to her liking.

Rita McNeil was so shy she left the stage before the mayor could present her with flowers.

Wayne Newton offered for auction a trip for two to Las Vegas with hotel accommodation, front-row tickets to his show and a limo for him and his wife.

It has been a tremendous run thanks to the hard work and dedication of dozens of committee members and hundreds of volunteers.

Congratulations to them and the mayor.

Tonight's Gala features the Beach Boys. Let's hope their music will usher in a time of smooth sailing for a city that's seen choppy water over the past two years.

MATTERS CONSIDERED1. Corporate Grants 2011

Corporate Report dated January 14, 2011 from the Commissioner of Community Services regarding the 2011 Corporate Grants program.

Mr. Taylor provided an overview of the 2011 Corporate Grants program. He advised that all applicants were accepting of the recommendations from staff except for Square One Older Adult Centre.

Ms. Hesjedahl spoke to the service that Square One Older Adult Centre provides to over 1600 members, their fundraising events and other government grant requests. She advised that the request for \$66, 393 in City grants is due to the growing demand for programs and services to accommodate the growth in membership the Centre is experiencing. Members of Committee spoke to the matter and commented on the contribution that the Centre has made to the Mississauga community.

Councillor Frank Dale moved that the recommendation be amended to provide Square One Older Adult Centre a 2011 Corporate Grant in the amount of \$66, 393. Paul Mitcham, Commissioner, Community Services advised that funding in part 11 of the recommendation should be increased to \$157,749 to reflect the amendment for Square One Older Adult Centre.

Play-More Assistance Program

April 10, 2006

The Mississauga Hockey League and its eight member Associations are proud to announce the Play-More Program, a program that assists players unable to participate in hockey due to severe financial constraints. The Program addresses the cost of playing hockey and enhancing player experiences.

Assistance from the Play-More program provides any eligible resident hockey player with the opportunity to play hockey at all competition levels.

As with every program, there are regulations, guidelines, program monitoring and qualifications to ensure that the program helps those in need. Hockey is one part of a player's experience, education is another part. The Mississauga Hockey League plans to work with students and parents on this initiative to help monitor the player/student's progress academically and on the ice. Positive feedback from both could result in renewal for the following season, providing the assistance conditions remain the same. < br>

1. Player must be a Mississauga resident and prove residency based on the City of Mississauga Recreation and Parks criteria.
2. The player cannot be currently registered with any hockey league.
3. There must be an opening within the age and skill level within the MHL.
4. The MHL will decide what Association the player will be registered with.
5. No releases will be granted once registered.
6. Parent must write a brief letter explaining the hardship.
7. Player must write a brief letter explaining why he/she wants to play hockey for the MHL.
8. Application for the Play-More Program must be received by the MHL office no later than August 1 of the playing season.
9. Notification on acceptance or rejection will not happen until September 1 of the playing season.
10. A "School Liason" volunteer will be appointed and assigned to the Player Assistance Committee. This person will provide guidance to the committee and the players on questions regarding the academic requirements of the program.

The Approval Process:

1. The names of the applicants will remain confidential. The MHL will review the applications and all attachments to determine extent of hardship assistance, if any.
2. Assistance can come in any or all of these categories:
 - a. Registration Fees Assistance (0 to 100%)
 - b. Equipment Assistance (0 to 100%)
 - c. Player Gate Fees Assistance (0 to 100%)
 - d. One Parent Gate Fee Assistance (0 to 100%)

The Monitoring Process:

1. Any player that receives a Gross Misconduct and Match Penalty may not be allowed to apply in future.
2. Any player that is requested to appear before the Discipline and Appeals Committee will not be allowed to apply in future.
3. Any player that receives a negative report from their school or has dropped out of school will not be allowed to apply in future.

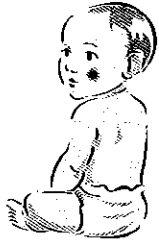

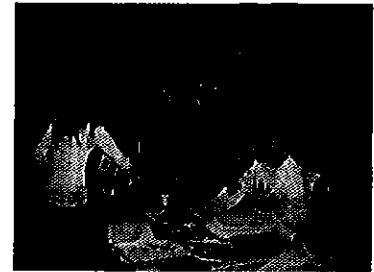
Trivia Night FUNtastic!

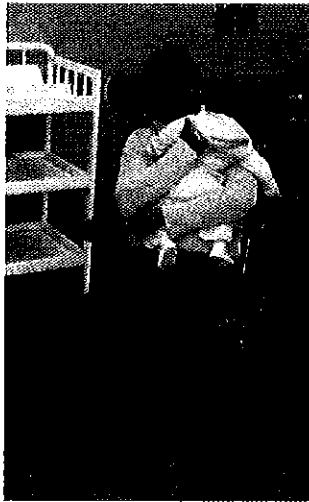

Vita's New Child Minding Centre for PACE (Parenting & Catholic Education) Teen Parent Program

Vita Centre has formed a very exciting partnership with the Dufferin Peel Catholic District School Board and the Peel Region Public Health Department to deliver a new PACE program for up to 15 students, who are pregnant or parenting, to attend an alternative school setting in our new offices.

Our role is to provide classroom space along with child minding for their babies. This encourages the students to continue their school studies during pregnancy and after birth. They are able to bring their babies with them each day while we provide child minding. Volunteers & placement students assist with child minding, under the leadership of a paid ECE (Early Childhood Educator).

The ability to provide this level of care is an important investment in the student's future stability and reduces the risk of them dropping out and not completing their education. Students also receive support from school social workers, a public health nurse and our community counsellors to help with health, family issues and the development of positive parenting & life skills.

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Youth-led projects receive support

An initiative to deter violence is among 11 youth-led projects receiving a United Way of Peel Youth in Action Grant this year.

Out of the Fire and into the Kitchen will receive \$2,000 through YMCA Peel Youth Village to teach youth the essential life skill of cooking. During weekly sessions, youth will prepare and share various dishes. They'll also discuss the justice system with various guest speakers.

The grants, totalling \$20,000, are funded by United Way of Peel Region and the Region of Peel. In its second year, the program will fund projects that include camps, workshops and mentoring sessions that aim to build confidence in youth aged 14 to 24, and help develop future leaders while improving neighbourhood life.

Vanessa Mui, Youth in Action Review Panel co-chair and United Way's Young Leaders Council executive member, says youth in Peel are restless for change.

"They are eager to tackle issues within their communities and act as agents of social change," she said. "We are excited to facilitate youth leadership and activism and empower youth to maximize their potential."

Other Mississauga projects receiving grants include:

- **Newcomer Youth Media Project.** The \$2,000 grant, distributed through the Dixie Bloor Neighbourhood Centre, will assist with the successful integration of newcomer youth by having them document their integration through film, photography and journalism. The project also promotes youth leadership and civic engagement while the final products will create awareness of the challenges faced during integration
 - **Project One: Operation Inspire 2.** The grant of \$1,838, distributed through the Gateway Centre for New Canadians, will continue to support dance workshops that encourage self-expression while mentoring youth on relevant teen issues. This is the second year this program has received a grant
 - **RHYTHM.** The grant of \$1,870, distributed through Rapport Youth and Family Services, aims to promote self-esteem, confidence and a positive self-image in youth by providing free dance classes. In addition to providing a safe environment where youth can explore their creativity, sessions will also include workshops on issues impacting youth
 - **The NUSAYbah Project.** The grant of \$2,000, distributed through the Social Planning Council of Peel, aims to provide female South Asian youth with a safe and creative place free from Islamophobia, racism and sexism. The youth will also have the opportunity to express themselves through art
 - **Youth Productions.** The \$2,000 grant, distributed through the Gateway Centre, will allow youth to explore serious and sensitive issues in a safe environment while expressing their creativity through dramatic arts. Youth will create and perform plays that address youth related issues

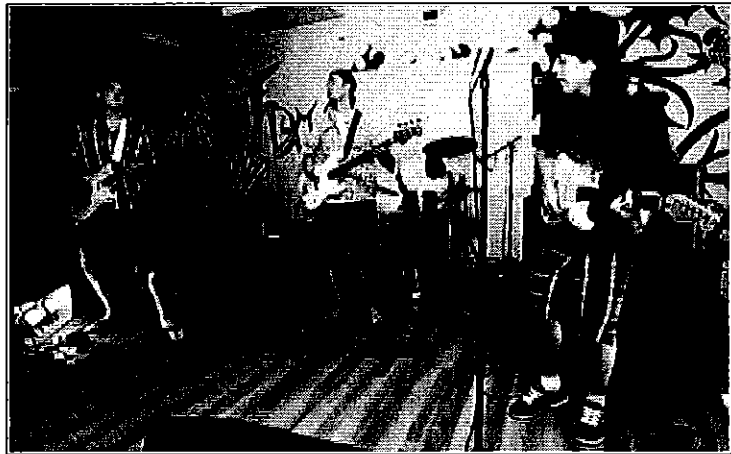
Much-needed funds raised at the concert will help fund programs for teenagers who drop into the centre where they can play video games, use computers, play pool or hang out.

Staffed by people who are only a few years removed from their own teenage years, The Dam youth drop-in in Meadowvale thrives on the close relationships between the at-risk teens who hang out there and the young staffers who host them.

The centre has been open for nearly 15 years, and started as a place for youth to drop in at the rear of the Meadowvale Town Centre.

The idea was the stem the flow of at-risk youth before they end up homeless; hence, the name "The Dam." On any given day, from as many as 40 "regulars" might walk through The Dam's doors. From 100-150 teens are there on a weekly basis.
