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City Centre

Community Profile

History

The current core of the City Centre began to take shape in 1953 when the Township of Toronto first zoned the area for future residential use. Development started in the late 1960s when the McLaughlin Group began to purchase the surrounding farmland, namely the Hodges, Hepton, McCauley and Davidson farms. In 1965, the group unveiled a massive 25-year plan for Toronto Township (Mississauga). Estimated at an unprecedented \$150 million dollars for the time - it included the development of 35 acres for industrial, 150 acres for commercial and 800 acres for residential purposes.

As a key focus to constructing a new city core, the McLaughlin Group planned the

construction of what would become the Square One Shopping Centre and new commercial core of the developing city. The planning behind Square One originally called for the area to be named "Greenfields", but was officially dubbed "Square One" to reflect its prominence as the new city core. Square One officially opened on October 3rd, 1973.

To date, about half the lands within the City Centre have been developed for a mix of civic, office, residential, retail and entertainment uses. The City Centre consists of the YMCA, Central Library, Civic Centre, Civic Square, Kariya Park, the Living Arts Centre and Square One.

The township offices first moved to this area from Cooksville in 1971 to the corner of Burnhamthorpe Road and Hurontario Street. A larger office tower in turn replaced this building. The current Civic Centre opened in 1987 and functions as a multi-purpose facility for both local government and community use.

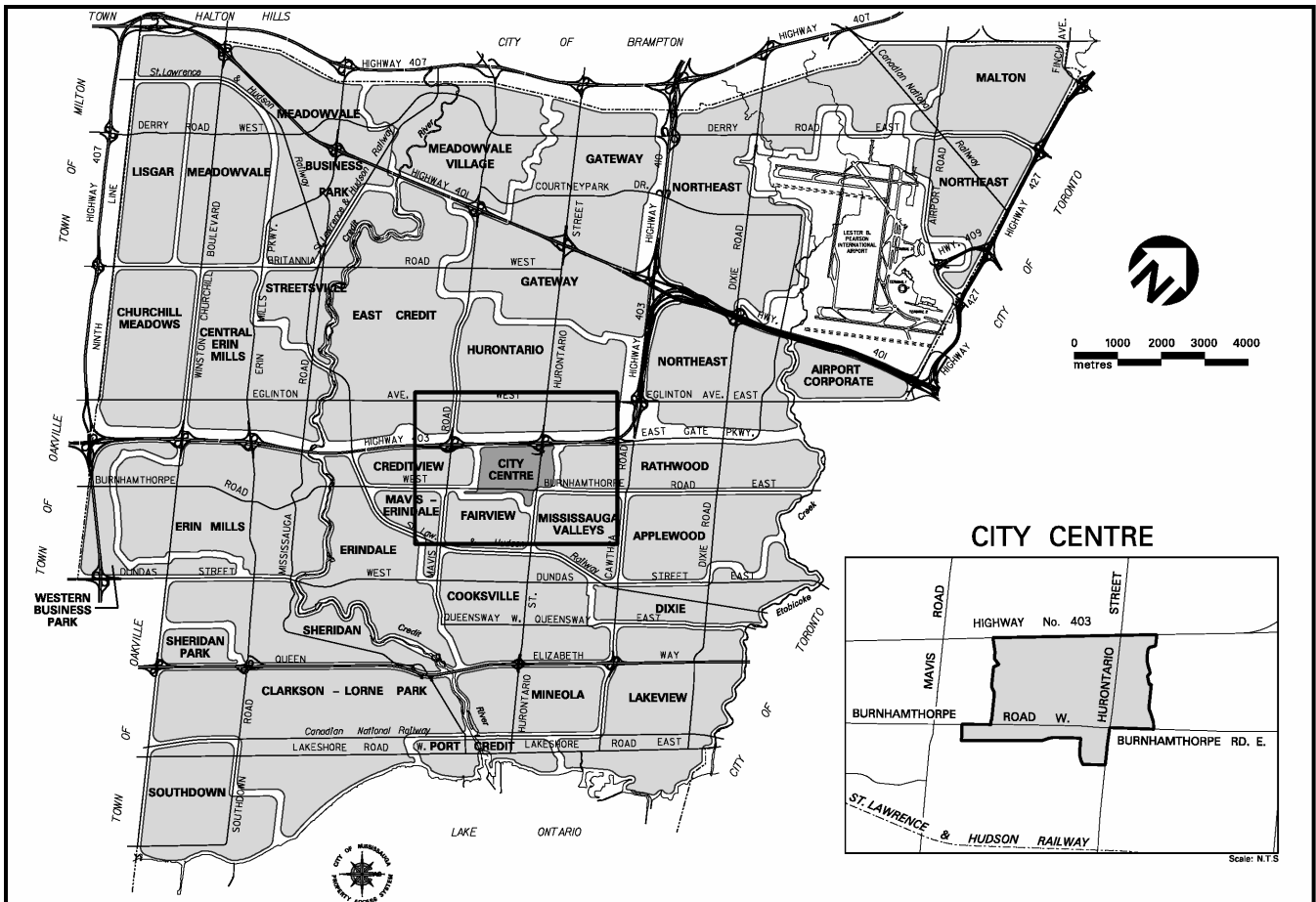


Figure 1. Population Pyramid

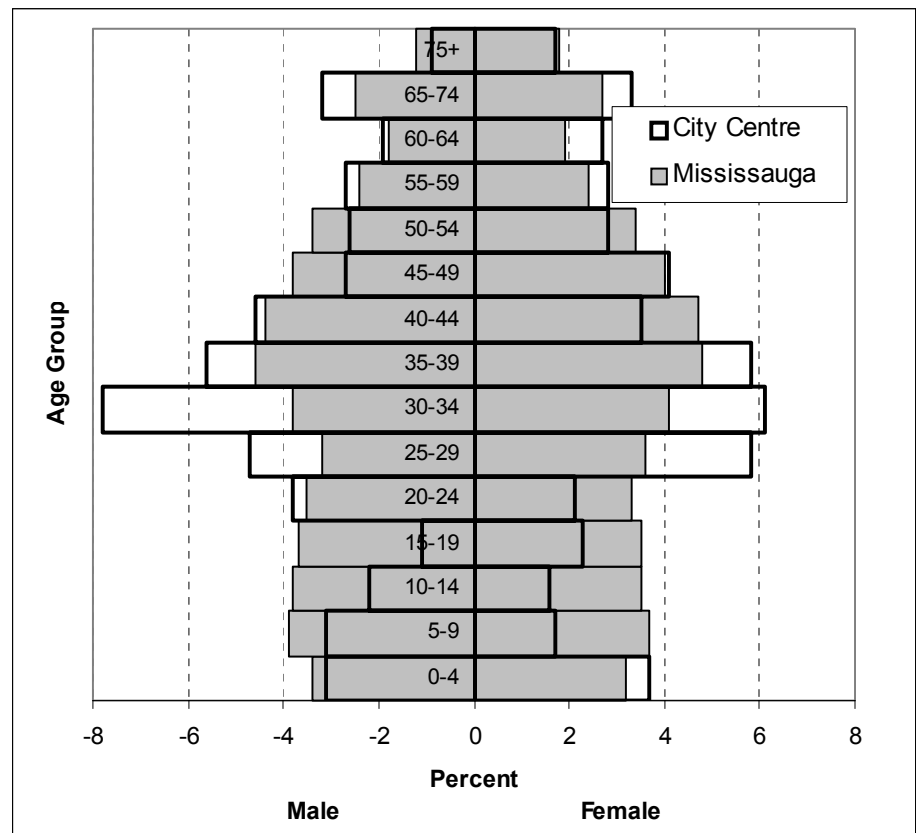
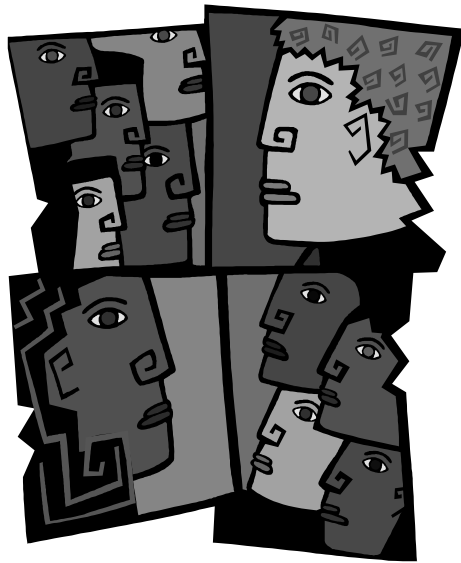
