Malton

Community Profile

History

Malton was first settled in approximately 1820 and was founded by Richard Halliday from Malton in Yorkshire, England.

The intersection of Derry Road and Airport Road was the village centre known as Four Corners. In the 1840s land was cleared northwest of the Four Corners and became the village of Malton.

By the 1850s Malton grew as a service centre with stores, a blacksmith and a hotel. With the completion of the Grand Trunk Railway in 1859, Malton grew to be a major grain handling and export centre for the area's wheat products and for the mills at Meadowvale. It was recognized as one of


the great wheat growing areas in Canada. However, its economic prosperity in the 1860s was short-lived.

Malton acquired some measure of self government in 1914 when it incorporated as a "police village". This allowed it to elect its own board of trustees to govern and create by-laws.

In 1937, the Toronto Harbor Commission selected thirteen farms adjacent to the village for an international airport. Consequently, Malton experienced a major shift from an agricultural to an industrial economy. The Four Corners expanded with many new businesses as a result of the

population explosion brought on by the new airport. The airport provided wartime prosperity during the 1940s and continued to be an integral part of the economy in the post-war years, when Malton acquired an international reputation as a leader in aeronautical design and manufacturing and became the home of the famous Avro Arrow.




Figure 1. Population Pyramid



Statistics Canada assigns data for an enumeration area to a single representation point. Where these representation points occurred in close proximity to the boundary of a planning district, data may have been inappropriately assigned to the planning districts. Some reassignments of data to planning districts were made to correct this situation. This occurred most often for residential areas adjacent to an industrial area. Adjustments were made to the Statistics Canada population data based on adjustments to the dwelling unit allocations. When dwelling unit reallocations were made, the associated population were also reallocated.
