COMMENTS

Background

Achieving a balance between the employment opportunities and the skills of the resident labour force is a goal established by the Official Plan for the City of Mississauga. In order to develop a means of monitoring the extent to which this goal is being achieved, a survey of employers in the City of Mississauga for 1979 was carried out by Planning staff.

A similar report on Employment in the City of Mississauga for 1978 was submitted to Planning Committee in 1980.

The report was prepared with technical assistance from the Economic Section of the Region of Peel Planning Department. It is based on a survey of employers carried out by the City's Planning Staff during the summer of 1980, and provides a comprehensive picture of the number of employment opportunities which existed in Mississauga in 1979 in all sectors.

2. Definitions

a) For the purpose of this report, and consistent with the definitions contained in the City Official Plan, the term "Manufacturing and Wholesaling" (M & W) refers to operations engaged in activities which are defined in the Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) Manual as industry numbers 101 to 399, 602 to 629 (see Appendix 1). The term Retail, Service and Construction (RSC) includes all other categories: construction, retail trade, estate, insurance, real finance, community services, business and personal services, public administration, transportation and utilities as well as primary industries. These RSC activities are identified in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual as industry numbers 001 to 099, 404 to 579, 631 to 999.*

*In earlier reports prepared by Regional Staff as input to the Regional Transportation Planning Study, the categories used to summarize the survey results were somewhat different. The "Industrial" Sector was defined as numbers SIC 001-626 inclusive and "Service" sector as industry numbers SIC 631-999 inclusive.

Employment

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b) In this report the term "Employment" is used to identify the number of full-time and part-time on-site and off-site employees working for an individual operation or within а qeographical area. The employment estimates provided in this report indicate the number of people working in Mississauga in 1979, whether or not they lived there. Thus, the employment figures provide an estimate of the City's work force, i.e., the total number of people employed in Mississauga.

3. **Employment Characteristics**

a) **Employees**

- As of December 1979 the number of people in the City's work force was estimated to be 154913. This is an increase of 12150 or 8.5% over the 1978 total of 142763.
- The Manufacturing and Wholesale Sector (M&W) underwent an increase of 5209 or 8.4% over the 1978 figure of 61972. It accounted for 67181 employees or 43.4% of the total work force, the same as 1978.
- The Retail, Service and Construction Sector (RSC) grew by 6941 or 8.6% to 87732 employees over the 1978 total of 80791. This sector accounted for 56.6% of the total work force, the same share as in 1978.

ь) **Employers**

- In 1979, the number of employers increased to 7730, an increase of 768 or 11.0% over the 1978 total of 6962.
- In the M&W Sector, the number of employers increased by 319 or 13% to 2706 from 2387 in 1978. This sector accounted for 35.0% of the total number of employers in 1979 compared with 34.3% in 1978.
- In the RSC sector, the number of employers increased by 449 or 9.8% to 5024 in 1979 from 4575 in 1978. This sector therefore accounted for 65.0% of the total number of employers, compared with 65.7% in 1978.

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c) Labour Force

The size of the resident labour force was estimated to be 145500,* an increase of 6000 or 4.3% over the 1978 figure of 139500. Therefore, with an increase of 12150 jobs in 1979, a surplus of approximately 9413 jobs existed in Mississauga in terms of the resident labour force. Thus, the increases in the number of new jobs being created are occurring faster than increases in the resident labour force.

d) Spatial Distribution

Table 1 shows the distribution of total employment in 1979 by traffic zone. Similar information is shown by planning district in Table 2. Total employment information by traffic zone is presented graphically in Map 1, while Map 2 graphically presents the same information by planning district.

The highest concentration of M&W employment occurred in traffic zone 110 (Airport Road) with 7437 employees or 10.9% of the total M&W employment. Traffic zone 109 (Toronto International Airport) accounted for the highest concentration of RSC employment with 11090 employees or 12.6% of the RSC employment. The highest concentration of total employment occurred in traffic zone 110 Airport Road with 11915 or 7.7%.

By planning district the highest concentration of RSC employment occurred in the Toronto International Airport with 11090 employees or 12.6% of the RSC employment. The highest concentration of M&W employment occurred in Airport Road with 14501 employees or 21.6%. In terms of total employment, Airport South had the highest concentration at 21226 or 13.7%.

*Based on City of Mississauga Planning Department estimates of Labour Force participation by age which includes all persons in the population 15 years of age or over who are employed part-time or full time or who are unemployed.

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4. Employer Characteristics

a) Distribution of **Employers** by Number of Employees - As is shown in Table 3 most of the employers in Mississauga are small establishments. In the RSC Sector 4484 or 89.2% of the establishments employed 25 or less employees. In the M&W Sector, the situation is only slightly different with 2180 or 80.6% employing 25 or less employees. Overall, 6664 or 86.2% of all establishments in Mississauga employed 25 or less employees. This accounted for 43146 or 27.9% of all employment in the City. Of the remaining employers, 10.7% employed 26-99 workers, and 2.7% employed 100-499 workers. Only 0.4% of the total number of employers employed 500 or more workers.

Of these 2.6 establishments which employ 500 or more workers, 17 are in the RSC sector and the remaining 9 are in the M&W sector. Taken as a whole, although these larger size establishments constitute only 0.4% of all establishments, they accounted for 34274 employees or 22.1% of the total employment.

b) Distribution of Employers by Categories - Tables 4 and 5 present a further breakdown of the M&W and RSC sectors by major activities within those sectors. The most notable increases have occurred in the Retail Trade, Personal Services, Health and Welfare, Warehousing, Manufacturing, and Wholesaling divisions.

5. Summary

- Total employment increased from 142763 in 1978 to 154913 in 1979. The M&W sector accounted for 43.4% while the RSC sector accounted for 56.6% of the total employment.
- The number of employers increased from 6962 to 7730 during the same period, of which 35.0% were in the M&W sector and 65.0% in the RSC sector.
- The highest concentration of employment 21226 is found in Airport South District.
- Employers tend to operate small size establishments, with more than 86.0% employing 25 or less workers and only 0.4% employing 500 or more workers.

- In terms of the distribution of employment by size of employers, the greatest proportion of employees occurred in the smaller size

CONCLUSION

The results of the 1979 survey indicate that there were approximately 9413 jobs in Mississauga, in excess of the resident labour force. This is consistent with one of the goals of the Official Plan which is to expand job opportunities to equal the resident labour force. Even though there was considerable growth in employment - 6941 employees in 1979 - in the RSC sector, this sector still accounts for approximately 57.0% of total employment - the same percentage as in 1978. Thus the City has had limited success in improving the match between labour force skills - which are mostly for RSC jobs - and employment opportunities.

RECOMMENDATION

That the report dated July 7, 1981, on employment in Mississauga, be received and forwarded to the Region of Peel for information.

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


