SUBJECT Report on Employment in the City of Mississauga - 1981

COMMENTS 1. BACKGROUND

Achieving a balance between employment opportunities and the skills of the resident labour force is a goal established in the Mississauga Official Plan. In order to monitor the extent to which this goal is being achieved, the Planning Department conducts an annual survey of employers in the City. The 1981 Employment Study updates the employment base established in 1980.

The results of the survey were tabulated using municipal computer services.

2. DEFINITIONS

Employment

This term is used to identify the number of full-time and part-time on-site and off-site employees working for an individual operation or within a defined geographical area. The employment estimates provided in this report indicate the number of people working in Mississauga in 1981, whether or not they lived there. Thus, the employment figures provide an estimate of the City work force, i.e., the total number of people employed in Mississauga.

Employer

This term includes all commercial, industrial and institutional establishments located in the City in 1981 that employed one or more persons.

Manufacturing and Wholesaling (M&W)

For the purpose of this report, and consistent with the definitions contained in the Official Plan, this term refers to operations engaged in activities which are defined in the Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) Manual as industry numbers 101 to 399, 602 to 629 (see Appendix 1).

Retail, Service and Construction (RSC)

This term includes construction, retail trade, finance, insurance, real estate, community services, business and personal services, public administration, transportation and utilities as well as primary industries. These RSC activities are identified in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual as industry numbers 001 to 099, 404 to 579, 631 to 999.

3. EMPLOYMENT CHARACTERISTICS

Employees

- As of December 1981 the number of people in the work force was estimated to be 170 776. This is an increase of 14 187 or 9.1% over the 1980 total of 156 589.
- The Manufacturing and Wholesale sector (M&W) underwent an increase of 1 565 or 2.3% over the 1980 figure of 69 237. It accounted for 70 802 employees or 41.5% of the total work force, - compared with 44.2% in 1980.
- The Retail, Service and Construction sector (RSC) increased 12 622 or 8.1% to 99 974 employees compared with the 1980 total of 87 352. This sector accounted for 58.5% of the total work force, compared with 55.8% in 1980.

### Employers

- In 1981, the number of employers was 8 529, an increase of 1 344 or 18.7% over the 1980 total of 7 185.
- In the M&W sector, the number of employers increased by 469 or 19.4% to 2 890 from 2 421 in 1980. This sector accounted for 33.9% of the total number of employers in 1981 compared with 33.7% in 1980.
- In the RSC sector, the number of employers increased by 875 or 18.4% to 5 639 in 1981 from 4 764 in 1980. This sector therefore accounted for 66.1% of the total number of employers, compared with 66.3% in 1980.

### Distribution of Employers by Number of Employees

As is shown in Table 1 most of the employers in Mississauga operate small size establishments in terms of the number they employ. Overall, 3 544 or 41.6% of all establishments in Mississauga employed 4 or less employees. These establishments, however, only accounted for 8 992 employees or 5.3% of the total employment in Mississauga.

Of the remaining employers, 24.0% employed 5-9 workers, 15.2% employed 10-19 workers, 12.2% employed 20-49 workers, 4.0% employed 50-99 workers, 2.5% employed 100-299 workers, 0.5% employed 300-499 workers, 0.1% employed 500-999 workers and 0.1% employed 1000 or more workers.

Fifteen establishments employed 500 or more workers. Taken as a whole, although these larger size employers constitute only 0.2% of all establishments, they accounted for 29 834 employees or 17.5% of the total employment.

### Distribution of Employers and Employment

Tables 2 and 3 present a further breakdown of the RSC and M&W sectors by major activities within those sectors. Those activities with the greatest proportion of employers in the RSC sector include; retail trade (33.4%), personal services (17.4%) and services to business (11.8%). The greatest proportion of employment comes from the following RSC activities; retail trade (17.4%), public administration (16.7%), transportation/communication and utilities (13.5%), services to business (13.6%) and personal services (11.5%). Within the M&W sector, manufacturing constitutes 69.1% of the employers and 83.2% of the employees. Wholesale activity constitutes 30.9% of employers and only 16.8% of employees.

### Spatial Distribution

Table 4 shows the distribution of total employment in 1981 by planning district. Similar information is shown by traffic zone in Table 5. Total employment information by planning district is presented graphically in Map 1, while Map 2 graphically presents the same information by traffic zone.

Overall, the planning district of Airport South had the greatest concentration of total employment with 25 470 or 14.9%. Traffic zone 100 (Airport South) accounted for the highest concentration of employment with 13 296 or 7.8%.

The highest concentration of M&W employment by planning district occurred in the Airport South District with 13 940 employees or 19.7% of M&W employment. The traffic zone with the highest concentration of M&W employment occurred in zone 100 (Airport South) with 8 648 employees or 12.2% of the total M&W employment.

The highest concentration of RSC employment by planning district occurred in the Toronto International Airport with 11 871 employees or 11.9% of total RSC employment. The traffic zone with the highest concentration of RSC employment occurred in zone 109 (Toronto International Airport) with 11 806 or 11.8% of the total RSC employment.

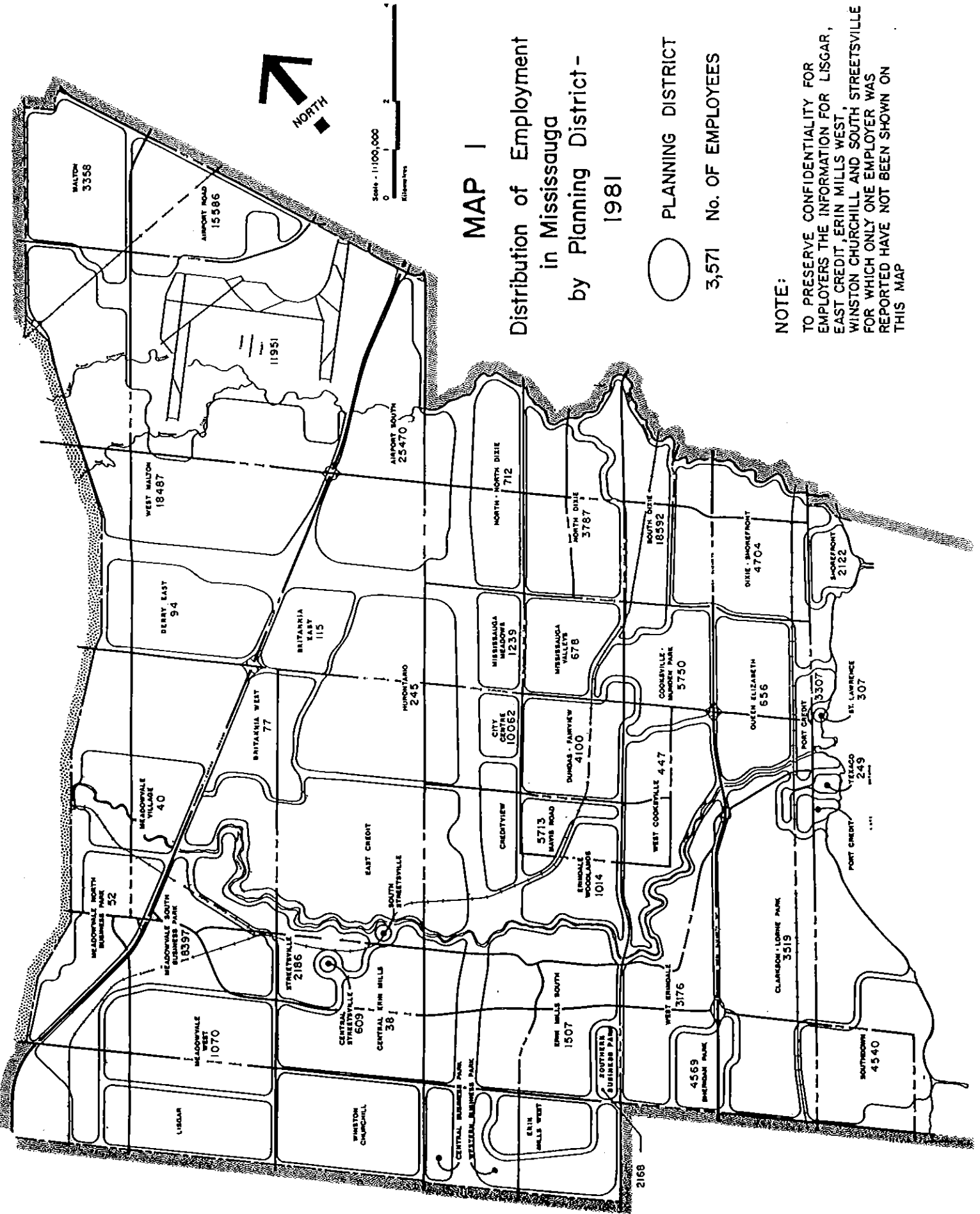

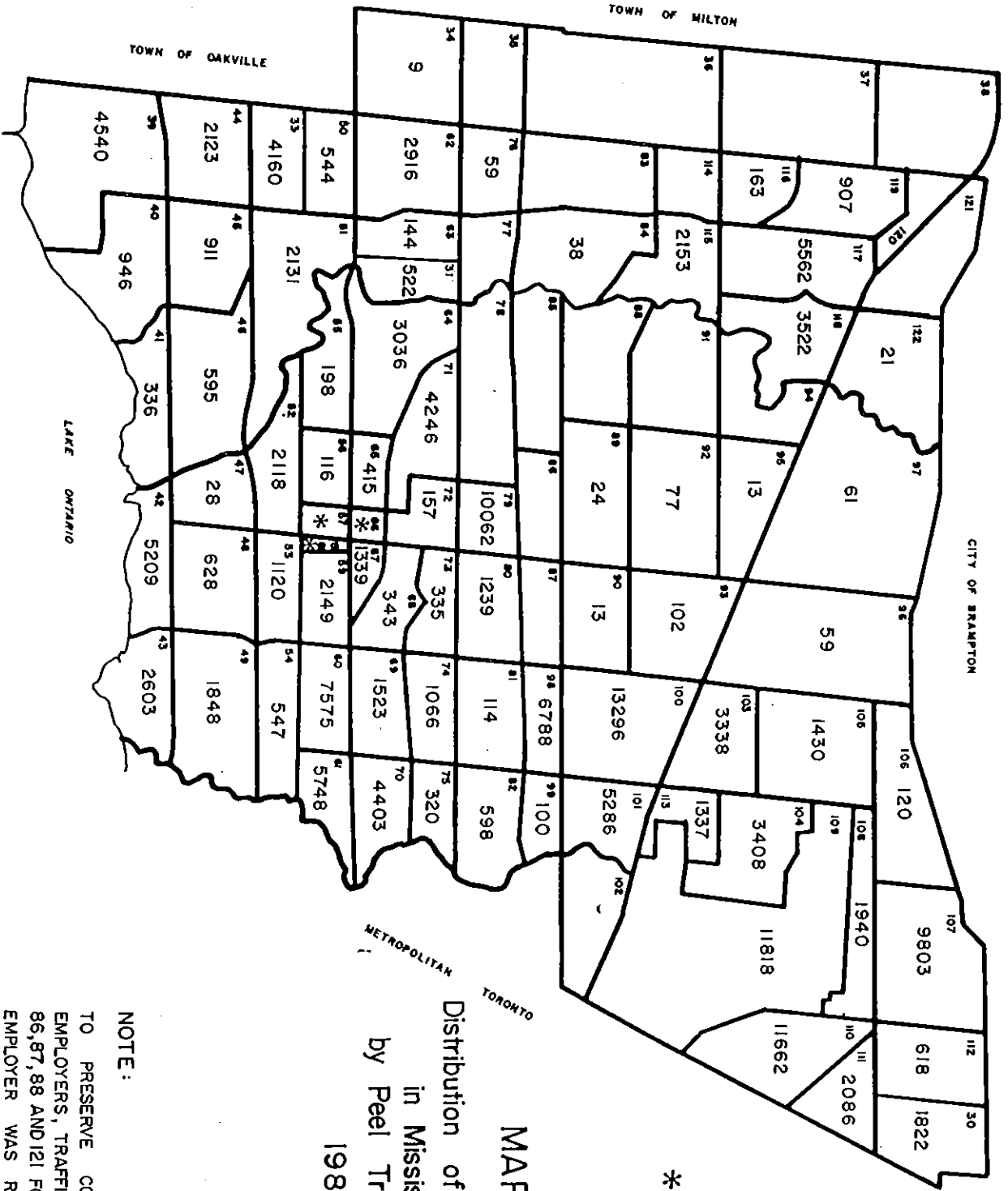

Table 6 exhibits the planning districts that experienced the greatest increase of employment in 1981. They were Airport South (3 027), West Malton (2 974), Meadowvale South (2 221) and City Centre (1 986).

#### Labour Force

The resident labour force was estimated to be 168 231\*, an increase of 12 990 or 8.4% over the 1980 figure of 155 241. A comparison of the resident labour force to total employment (170 776) reveals that 2 545 more job opportunities existed in Mississauga than could be filled by the resident labour force.

#### 5. SUMMARY

- Total employment increased from 156 589 in 1980 to 170 776 in 1981. Employment in both the M&W sector and the RSC sector increased.
- The M&W sector accounted for 41.5% of the total employment while the RSC sector accounted for 58.5%.
- The number of employers increased from 7 185 in 1980 to 8 529 in 1981. Total employers in both the M&W and RSC sector increased.
- The M&W sector accounted for 33.9% of all employers while the RSC sector accounted for 66.1%.
- The highest concentration of employment is found in the Airport South District with a total of 25 470 employees.
- Employers tend to operate small size establishments, with almost two thirds (65.6%) employing 9 or less workers and only 0.2% employing 500 or more workers.

\*Estimates of labour force participation includes all persons in the population 15 years of age or over multiplied by the 1981 Statistics Canada labour participation rate of 71.6%. Since an entire assessment of population was not undertaken in 1981, the June 1981 Census population was used in the calculation of labour force.

- In terms of the distribution of employment by size of employers, the greatest proportion of total employment occurred in those establishments with between 20 and 300 employees. They accounted for 50.8% of the total employment.
- Airport South was the district with the greatest increase of employment with 3 027 more employees in 1981 as in 1980.
- The total employment in 1981 exceeded the total labour force found in the City.

CONCLUSION

The results of the 1981 survey indicate that overall employment and the number of employers have increased in Mississauga. It has been indicated statistically that the City of Mississauga is achieving one of its Official Plan goals, which is to expand job opportunities to equal the resident labour force.

RECOMMENDATION

That the report dated January 20, 1983, on employment in Mississauga, be received and forwarded to the Region of Peel for information.
